



Villa Park opens its first park

Despite its name, the city of Villa Park has never had a park. Until now.

The city's first park, a gently rolling stretch of green along Wanda Road at Villa Park Road, was completed last month -- 28 years after the city was incorporated.

The area is perfect for an easy walk or a quick run.

Constructing the park was no nple task. The site was an simple task. abandoned railroad right-of-way.

For decades, railway workers had brought in new topsoil to nurture sprayed the area with powerful herbicides to keep weeds and brush from overtaking the railroad tracks.

As a result, nothing much grew in the dead soil.

After many dormant years, soil tests indicated that most of the chemicals had leached out.

Landscapers then removed the top eight inches of soil, using it as a base for the gently rolling mounds receptables -- so city residents can that now dot the area. Then they

the grass, white alders, jacarandas, liquid ambers and day lillies planted there.

The 1-1/4-acre park, between Villa Park Road and Lincoln Street, and the 1/4-acre parklet at Wanda Road and Collins Avenue, cost \$160,000 to create. The area is meant to be a passive park. City officials don't plan to add any park equipment -- aside from litter enjoy the peaceful look of the area.
